Occupy Wall Street Shares Its Message with Brooklyn **Friends**

On the afternoon of First Day, February 12, a panel of four shared their experiences with, and commitment to, the Occupy Wall Street movement. The panel included two Friends from Brooklyn Meeting.

The first to speak was Merissa Holmes, who described her previous experiences with student movements (including those with an anarchist history). Her focus was on tactics available to the Occupy groups for protesting against financial institutions and publicizing inequality, such as locking down banks and demonstrating at the homes of business or political leaders.

Matt Presto, a teacher at Friends Seminary, described how he educated his students about the movement. He explained the horizontal organization of Occupy Wall Street, in which interest groups are like spokes in a wheel and no central authority exists. He pointed out that the democratic decision-making process using consensus is similar to that which is employed by Ouakers.

Informed by his experiences with the Palestinian uprising while attending a Quaker school there, Amin Hussein emphasized the effectiveness of direct action in empowering marginalized voices and circumventing the media.

Lyn Pyle and Tom Rothschild, Friends from Brooklyn Meeting, expressed their commitment to the Occupy movement and connected it to the Quaker testimonies of Equality and Nonviolence. Lyn expressed her enthusiasm for the participation of young people, who are rediscovering and reclaiming the world while dedicating themselves to our future survival. Tom. building on his own past experience with the struggle for Civil Rights, is now participating in the "Occupy Faith" group. This group is made up of members of spiritual and religious organizations, who are working together to lay a spiritual foundation for the movement. He is committed to this effort because it is based on community, non-violence, and equality and justice for all. Tom and Lyn recommended that Brooklyn minute our support of Occupy Wall Street and the Occupy movement at our next Meeting for Business. This support would be based on Occupy's use of democratic consensus and dedication to the Friends Testimonies of Equality and Nonviolence. A list of Meetings that have done this was distributed.

Following the presentations, Friends shared thoughts and questions with the Membership Expanding panelists.

These included:

"Clarify what Occupy Wall Street stands for."



"Declaration of Occupation," but reminded that the group is evolving based on a "nonbinding consensus" coming out of a "people's assembly."

> "What kind of direct action do you advocate and against what?"

We were told that sites of injustice and capitalism are targeted and non-violent tactics are strategically used.

"What specific results have you had?" Through the concept of the 99% vs. the 1%, Occupy has raised awareness and pressured politicians and business leaders to reexamine executive pay and economic inequality in general.

"How do you reconcile the practice of consensus with Quaker practice of "sense of the meeting" which is worship based?" This question was left to be considered

After the panel, Friends and guests separated into small groups for worship sharing and returned for a brief summary.
