Committee on Ministry and Counsel Reports on an Active Year

The Committee has organized itself around the following tasks:

1. Clearness for Membership.
2. Ongoing Support Groups for Members with both chronic and short term needs.
3. Care Teams for Help with Daily Living.
4. Emergency Response Teams.

A Pastoral Care Subcommittee provides care for Friends with disabilities. Friends from the Meeting volunteered to help with some of these tasks. The Committee also cooperated with Yearly Meeting ARCH in providing a workshop on Hospice Care, and, additionally, helped members with a Health Care Proxy and an Advance Care Directive.

Meeting Retreat

The committee sponsored a Meeting Retreat at Powell House in May, at which 54 adults and children participated. The Committee has reserved two houses for the 2014 Retreat, scheduled to take place on October 17th.

Ministry and Counsel continues to provide members for the Facing Bench, for Meetings for Worship at 9:00 and 11:00 and Tuesdays at 6:30 PM. The Adult Education Subcommittee sponsors Worship Sharing on a Spiritual Text on the second First Day of each month, and this year is sponsoring an educational program, Quakerism 101, for new and regular members.

Bayard Rustin of 15th Street Meeting Receives Presidential Medal of Honor

On November 20, Bayard Rustin was posthumously presented with the Presidential Medal of Honor by President Obama. His long-time partner and New York Yearly Meeting staff member, Walter Naegle, received it for him. As one part of his long and influential career as a leader for Peace and Civil Rights, Bayard Rustin organized the March on Washington. I recall Bayard Rustin in the 1950's as the organizer of the Fellowship of Reconciliation, a combination of Peace groups in the Middle West, when I was a student in Ohio and Chicago, Illinois. This was the McCarthy era, and the political right was as aggressive at that time as it is now. Bayard Rustin was then, as later, a shining light for young people.

News of Quakers in the Philippines

The Quaker Peace Team in Indonesia has had some communication from Quaker Churches in the Philippines since the recent storm there, though electricity is down in many places. There are over 40 evangelical Quaker churches in the islands with as many as 1500 total members. At least one church in Danao was completely uprooted and seven churches in Samar Province were damaged. More news will likely arrive as communication is restored.

Will We Be Ready for Socially Responsible Giving?

This past year New York Quarterly Meeting returned to the Monthly Meetings their usual contribution to the Quarter of \$13,000. This was in response to the Mission Statement of the Quarterly Meeting encouraging it to support Monthly Meetings charitable giving, rather than giving directly from the Quarterly Meeting itself. As Brooklyn Meeting budget is due in April, there is still time for Friends to consider how we should spend this money. The Newsletter is helping this process by running a series of articles informing members about the opportunities for giving to a variety of Quaker founded and/ or operated service organizations.

Begun in 1975, when a group of inmates along with Quakers at Greenhaven Penitentiary in New

York State developed a workshop for youth coming into conflict with the law, AVP now sponsors workshops to reduce conflict in businesses, churches, half way houses, shelters and other groups in the United States and in many parts of the world. The workshops are interactive and involve role playing and exercises to control situations that can become violent. Approximately 14,000 prisoners in the U.S. participated in 30 states last year. Workshops took place in more than 50 countries around the world. The workshops are conducted by trained volunteers. [Next month, another Quaker service project]

Brooklyn Meeting Mourns the Passing of Emily Ranseen

Emily Ranseen, a long-term attender of Brooklyn Meeting, passed away on November 10, 2013. A quiet presence at meeting, we remember her often greeting us at the front door on Sunday morning; she was clerk of the Welcoming committee.

We were aware of her leading to encourage the meeting to write letters to soldiers serving in Afghanistan. Behind this concern lay a deep study of the literature of peace and war -- not just Quaker writings, but also books on political and psychological analyses of the motivations behind war. She was studying to enlarge her understanding of how to bring the Peace Testimony to action in our lives.

What we weren't aware of was her rich life outside of meeting -- Chinese calligraphy and *Sumi E* watercolor painting, work as a

landscape architect and later as a research librarian.

Daughter of Swedish immigrants, Emil Ranseen and Agnes James Ranseen, she was born Sept 24, 1948 in Andersonville, outside of Chicago, IL. She entered high school the first year that they offered Chinese language and studied it for the full four years. She continued Chinese studies while attending Pomona College in Clermont, CA, and for her junior year stayed with a family in Taiwan.

She married briefly and moved to New York City, which has been her home ever since. She studied landscape architecture at the New York Botanic Garden, and worked in landscape design for years at the NY Housing Authority. When she was laid off due to budget cuts, a generous settlement enabled her to go back to school and study to become a librarian. She worked at the NY Public Library and held various jobs organizing records in various companies. Most recently, she worked part-time at the CCNY library.

Emily had a life-long interest in Zen meditation and Buddhism. She attended the Unitarian Church for a number of years and came to Brooklyn Meeting more than 20 years ago.

One Friend made this observation: "Emily impressed me as someone working very hard to try to find peace in herself and in her world, and it's no small thing that she found Brooklyn Meeting a steady place to bring that search."
