February Meeting for Business Well Attended

More than 35 members and attenders gathered in a chilly Meeting room for the February Meeting for Business. The agenda included reports from the Treasurer, the Finance and Collections Committee, the Communications Committee and the final draft of the State of the Meeting Report which was approved and is included in this Newsletter.

2016 Powell House Retreat Scheduled

The Retreat Committee announced that the 2016 Meeting Retreat will take place in the spring -- April 29 through May 1.

Ministry and Counsel Committee Recommendation to New York Yearly Meeting Regarding Friends United Meeting Policy toward LGBTQ Personnel Is Approved

The following minute will be sent on to New York Yearly Meeting: "Brooklyn Meeting urges New York Yearly Meeting to follow the example of Canada Yearly Meeting and draft a letter to Friends United Meeting expressing our displeasure at its current discriminatory policy against LGBTQ Quakers in paid or unpaid positions of service or leadership." The letter further states that "until such time as such policies are laid aside and equality embraced for all Quakers, it will only designate its payments to Friends United Meeting for specific projects

which, in the opinion of New York Yearly Meeting, are worthy."

Finance and Collections Committee Reports

The Finance and Collections Committee reported that, for the period April 1 to December 31, 2014, the Meeting budgeted \$77,318.10 and spent \$75,108.16.

Meeting Treasurer Reports; Her Requests Are Approved

Treasurer Danielle Dybiec recommended, and the Meeting approved, two financial requests to be carried over into 2015 from 2014: \$2,500 for a Teen Documentary Project and \$843.00 (unspent from the Child Care Committee budget) for new toys.

Communications Committee Reports on Newsletters and Website

The Committee published a three-five page newsletter every month except August of this year. The newsletter included a calendar of events, a summary of monthly Meeting for Business and news of Meeting activities and other local Quaker entities. It also provided guidelines for Friends to contribute their own news or articles. The committee maintains the Meeting website and on-line calendar which are open to items from Friends. Group Considers Early Quaker Writings

The first of a series of sessions on Early Quaker Writings, which will continue to meet on the second First Day of the month, took place in the Meeting room at 1 p.m. on February 8. The selections were based on the book, "Truth of the Heart" by Rex Ambler and from the writings of George Fox.

In these passages, George Fox shares his struggles, loneliness and inner conflicts. He is sometimes critical and even harsh. He uses images of the turmoil of the sea. At the same time there is faith that he will figure it out. He experiences God as an anchor and a comfort in spiritual crisis. The transformation is through light. This is a democratic process in that any individual can experience it in their own unique way. And the revelation is not fixed but can grow and change.

STATE OF THE MEETING REPORT FOR 2014

The King James Bible states, in Micah 6:8:

...and what doth the Lord require of thee, but to do justly, and to love mercy, and to walk humbly with thy God?

Brooklyn Meeting is a spiritual and physical place in which we come together to honor these directives. We do not always achieve them because we are imperfect creations. But in our ever-evolving practices individually and as a body we continue to hold them foremost.

Humility regarding our place in Creation and toward our planet and its inhabitants was manifested by the meeting's growing concerns around climate change issues:

- 1) A minute requesting top priority for matters of climate change was sent to New York Yearly Meeting and New York Quarterly Meeting.
- 2) We requested NYQM to address the issue of converting utilities to solar power.
- 3) We held a discussion on offshore energy issues.

- 4) There was a called meeting on climate change, prior to our participation in the New York City climate change march (and our hosting of out-of-town marchers overnight in the meetinghouse).

There are ways in which the larger community affects us on issues of justice. Peace and Social Action Committee has focused on anti-fracking and food justice activism. We note the increasing amount of racial diversity in Meeting. We seek a way toward a discussion on racism, especially in response to the New York Yearly Meeting's "Apology to Afro-Descendants." As in the days of John Woolman, we continue to discern the proper response to the painful, unjust relationship that has existed between European-Americans and African-Americans since the founding of our country.

This year saw the need for wisdom in dealing with some fiscal challenges. Because of a change in our fiscal year to correspond with the calendar year, we are working with a nine-month budget but less time to raise funds. And there is a continual need to encourage members and attenders to donate on a monthly basis, not just at the end of the fiscal year. A new responsibility for our Meeting is the distribution of \$13,000 formerly given to New York Quarterly Meeting and now available to us on an annual basis for BMM/Quaker projects. We funded six projects: a Two Row Wampum campaign teach-in; anti-fracking events; donations to Quaker Earthcare Witness; Ramallah Friends School; the African Great Lakes Education Committee of NYQM; and enhancement of our own monthly community dinner. We have tried to use our monies to reflect our commitment to justice, mercy, and humility.

Spiritual needs of members and attenders continue to be met by ongoing and one-off events:

- Ministry and Counsel Committee sponsored spiritual education in the form of Quakerism 101 and other adult

education programs, such as monthly “sacred texts” and worship-sharing sessions. We continued to hold weekly smaller, quieter meetings for worship at 9am on Sundays and on Tuesdays at 6:30pm. Communications Committee began a “My Journey” series in the meeting newsletter in which people share their paths to Quakerism and our meeting. Out of our annual retreat on the theme of “Practice,” emerged a longing for the Meeting to find ways for deep conversations on spiritual matters.

The LBGTQ Subcommittee of Ministry and Counsel has been resurrected and has recently sponsored a number of events.

Good relationships continue between the Meeting and the two Friends schools located in Brooklyn. Unfortunately, weather caused the cancellation of the annual faculty and staff appreciation dinner, but this tradition will continue in 2015. In February a panel discussion on Quaker education was held.

Humbly recognizing the diverse backgrounds of our members and attenders, we honor their varying philosophies and backgrounds (Buddhist, yoga, nature, mixed religion – Islam/Quaker and Jewish/Quaker). We seek to integrate people from varying age groups in our activities. Young Adult Friends continue their many activities, including a newsletter, potlucks and hikes with worship. We are fortunate in having this growing presence and look forward to exploring ways of promoting more integration with the rest of the meeting. Young families are another growing presence. First Day School consists of three classes. Childcare is provided for children under three years of age. In addition, a special bequest permitted hiring of a teen coordinator. We look for ways to help these busy families

become more involved with committee work. We also seek to honor the contributions of our older members. The History Committee has interviewed eight of our oldest members and published five of those interviews. For our departed Friends, we have held memorial meetings and created memorial minutes. The Pastoral Care Subcommittee of Ministry and Counsel has provided support for caregivers, and has worked with the NYYM ARCH (Aging Resources Consultation and Help) initiative to help those in need.

There is a vibrancy even in the frequent silences of our 11 a.m. Meetings for Worship, which attests to the way that inner contemplation coexists and is mutually nurtured by the principle-driven activities of our Meeting. Justice, mercy, and humility are intertwined ideals that can be seen in our interactions within our community and in our relationships outside our Meeting.

On the afternoon of February 15, Friends gathered to share their thoughts and feelings about the Apology approved by New York Yearly Meeting Fall Sessions. They learned more about the practice of institutional apology and how the decision was made in Yearly Meeting. Friends expressed concerns about the history of racism in this country and the presence of so many African-Americans in prison and in the criminal justice system. They spoke of the importance of examining their own lives and attitudes and how comfortable African-American members and attenders feel in Brooklyn Meeting.

Friends agreed that the Meeting needs to give life to the Apology in the community and continue the search for justice without and loving relationships within.
